Your Support Changes Lives

Today, HomeSafe brings hope and support to more than 16,000 clients annually through the valuable programs we offer. We provide full-time care and treatment services through our residential program for children who have been removed from their family due to abuse and neglect. The SafetyNet program provides weekly therapeutic support groups and services for adults and children affected by domestic violence. Healthy Beginnings, a program of the Children's Services Council, is a preventative program that conducts free developmental assessments for children under the age of five, living in Palm Beach County.


Maria's Story – SafetyNet

Maria is a Hispanic woman in her mid-forties, who was referred to HomeSafe through the State Attorney's office after she and her kids had been living in fear. Maria came from a domestic violence situation where she was abused, stalked, and harassed by Jose, her past boyfriend and father of her youngest son.

With SafetyNet's encouragement, she was able to get a restraining order against Jose, but that is just a small step in the process. Maria still lived in fear of Jose, and he often showed up to her son's baseball games just to get in contact with her. Her children were living in constant fear, and they couldn't get their mother to call the police when Jose would break the restraining order and show up at their house.

Through family sessions at HomeSafe and by attending the weekly therapeutic support groups, Maria was able to open up and connect with her children and realize their fear was keeping them from living their lives. After approximately three months of sessions, the children's behavior became less fearful and angry, and Maria was able to overcome her fear of Jose. She now had the courage to call the authorities when he continued to harass her, leading to his arrest. Her sons also received caring support to help them process and understand their experiences living in a violent home.

Maria and her sons are now able to live in peace. She is free from violence, free from abuse, but most importantly, free from fear.



Chris's Story – Residential Living Program

Chris was only 15 when he came to HomeSafe after being abused and neglected by his family. He had aggressive behavior, and often had trouble controlling his emotions due to his previous traumatic experiences. With the help of therapy and unconditional love and support from staff, Chris was able to change his behavior and channel his emotions into poetry.

At the age of 18, Chris graduated from the residential program and went to live at Crossroads Community Care. He was able to stay there while he kept a job and finished high school. Crossroads was so impressed with Chris that they made him a tour guide for incoming clients. He stayed until he outgrew the program, then transferred to Villages of Hope residential program. While working two jobs, Chris excelled at Villages of Hope, and accepted a tour guide position there as well.

Chris later met with Habitat for Humanity while applying for home ownership. Habitat was so impressed with him that they offered him a full-time job. Last January, he received the keys to his new house.

Thanks to the dedicated staff and safe environment at HomeSafe, Chris truly matured and worked through his issues. He often comes back to mentor clients in the residential program, and even welcomed a former client to live with him.

Martina's Story – Healthy Beginnings

Martina H. heard about our Growing Smart program at the hospital after delivering her son Isaias. Growing Smart is a free program offered in English, Spanish and Creole, that gives parents living in Palm Beach County the opportunity for early detection of possible developmental or behavioral problems. During this two year program, participating families receive six home visits from a Developmental Support Specialist (DSS) who will engage them to practice different activities with their child, based on: communication, fine and gross motor, problem solving, and personal and social skills.

Over the next two years, the DSS met with the family, brought books for Isaias, and provided Martina with information to help her as Isaias began to grow. During this time, Isaias didn't crawl much and had not begun to try and walk. The DSS taught Martina some techniques to help her son, and with the donation from HomeSafe of a Sit-to-Stand Learning Walker, Isaias was running in no time.
