Thank you once again for taking the time to get caught up on what's been happening at HomeSafe during the past year. I will say, as you read on, you will find out that it has been a very active and fulfilling one for all of the staff.

The year started with the exciting news of the sale of the Sylvester Family Campus, followed quickly by the purchase of

vacant land in West Palm Beach for the first of two replacement campuses. We have run into some resistance from the surrounding neighbors, but we hope in time, they will recognize the benefits we bring to the county and to the families and children in need of our services. We continue with the process of securing a second location, and hope to have one purchased in the near future.

Our Healthy Beginnings Prevention Program is expanding once again to meet the growing needs in our county. We are adding seven new positions and creating a Central West Team to better serve the western communities and their expanded growth. Remember, if you know of a child between birth and age five who may have developmental delays, do not hesitate to reach out to us. For free, we will screen any child under the age of five. It is better to address any developmental delays early rather than have those issues linger and only get worse as the child grows.

Lastly, thank you to everyone who has supported our mission and made contributions to our success this past year. Your generosity allows HomeSafe to continue providing exceptional services to children and families who need it most. I hope that after reading this annual report, you will once again support the good work we are doing in Palm Beach County.

HomeSafe provides comprehensive programs preventing new cases of violence, protecting victims of child abuse and domestic violence, and preparing children and families for safer, more productive lives.

A Few of the Year's Highlights...

HomeSafe at Pond Place turned a year old! The program continues to grow and thrive, with the majority of the clients being young women. We've had two clients graduate high school and one earn an associate's degree from Palm Beach State College.



In May, HomeSafe was reaccredited for another four years by the Council on Accreditation (COA). This is a significant achievement for our staff and board. COA accreditation affirms that an organization meets the highest national standards of best practice, and establishes the organization's credibility as effective and professionally sound. In addition, it provides assurance to all of our stakeholders (clients, staff, board, donors and funders) that HomeSafe is delivering needed, high-quality services in our community, conducting its operations successfully, and managing its funds effectively.





Healthy Beginnings

- During the last fiscal year, our hospital liaisons visited 14,861 new moms before they were discharged from the hospital. Helpful information was provided about postpartum depression, bonding, and child development.
- The agency provided 148 portable cribs for free to parents in need to ensure their child had a safe place to sleep. Along with the cribs, each family received educational material to help inform them of the practices of safe sleep.
- 3,586 children were screened by HomeSafe for their behavioral and social/emotional health to ensure they are kindergarten ready. Healthy Beginnings conducts free developmental assessments for all children under the age of five throughout Palm Beach County.
- 269 clients were enrolled in the Growing Smart program - a voluntary, two-year program that teaches parents about developmental stages and provides parenting tips. A child's development is monitored by the developmental support specialist who will provide a referral, should a concern be discovered.

Residential Group Care

- During fiscal year 2017-18, a total of 118 girls and boys, ages 9–17, received full-time care and treatment services at five group homes located in Boca Raton, Lake Worth and West Palm Beach.
- The agency continues to serve clients who have greater levels of trauma. Consistently we have seen that when the children we serve are able to remain in our homes for more than six months, there is a greater likelihood of success. In this fiscal year, there were 77 client discharges:
 - 31 stepped down or aged out
 - 46 moved to a lateral program or higher level of care*
 - *We serve children at the least restrictive level possible. After being placed at HomeSafe, it is sometimes discovered that a client needs a more restrictive program to help them with their needs.
- Our LifeSkills program is provided to all clients living in residential group care. Twice a week, clients attend group trainings that provide them with the knowledge and tools they will need for independent living keeping a clean room, personal hygiene, shopping and cooking, how to do laundry, educational planning, using community services, and applying for a job. Clients are tested pre- and post-trainings. This year's post-assessment average was 93%, up 13% from last year.
- ① On the last day of school, of the 45 clients in our residential program, 96% were promoted to the next grade level. 93% of the total residential population that attended school throughout the fiscal year maintained an 80% attendance rate for the school year.






SafetyNet

- 472 victims received domestic violence crisis intervention services. Of those, 96 adult, 39 teen and 41 child clients enrolled in group and/or individual therapy and successfully completed the program. 53 children were provided on-site childcare services by our volunteers while their parents and older siblings attended group.
- 85% of adult and teen clients demonstrated an increase in adaptive coping and resiliency skills as evidenced by preand post-assessments.
- 99% of clients indicated "satisfaction" with program services in their quarterly client satisfaction surveys.
- 11 volunteers assisted in serving meals to the children prior to group, and provided childcare to kids under 5 years of age.
- Four students enrolled in the master's program in social work from Florida Atlantic University and Barry University interned with the program, and co-facilitated groups and provided supervised individual therapy to clients.
- One of our teen clients, Ricky, received a \$500 Barry Krischer Scholarship Award from the Domestic Violence Council of Palm Beach County for college expenses at Palm Beach State College. The scholarship was awarded based on his essay about his personal challenges in confronting family violence.

HomeSafe at Pond Place

- A total of 16 clients were served by the program during fiscal year 17-18. All of the clients were enrolled in school. 63% were enrolled in Palm Beach State College or a vocational program. 37% attended high school.
- Two clients graduated high school and will be starting Palm Beach State College. One client graduated Palm Beach State College with an associate's degree.


