Dear Friends,

Thank you for your generous support throughout an amazing year here at HomeSafe. Our programs continue to provide unwavering support to Palm Beach County, reaching more than 14,000 members of our community because of your belief in our mission and our determination to prevent, protect and prepare our most vulnerable residents.

Our programs continue to grow and change, hand in hand, with the needs of the community. During the past year we transitioned our Enhanced Behavioral Health Overlay Services program to an additional Specialized Therapeutic Group Care facility, as demand has increased for that specific type of placement. We continue to look for replacement properties since the sale of the Sylvester Family Campus, with one property secured and a second location being sought out. Our executive team was successful in negotiating rates with our Community Base Care agencies,

and HomeSafe was able to give all Youth Development Professional (YDP) staff a well-earned increase in wages. The YDP staff are the direct care givers, caring for our clients who suffer every day from the trauma of their abuse.

HomeSafe's Healthy Beginnings program will be expanding over the next year to include positions that operate in conjunction with *The Thirty Million Words* Initiative. TMW is an evidence-based intervention program designed to help narrow the language gap between children from lower-income families and those in wealthier households. HomeSafe will be working with mothers and newborns at St. Mary's Hospital and, if the program resonates, will expand to other hospitals in Palm Beach County.

A heartfelt thank you to everyone who has supported HomeSafe through monetary or in-kind support. Your contributions have led to one of the most successful years for the agency since I started at HomeSafe in 1998. Together we continue to provide exceptional services to children and families who need it the most. This year, HomeSafe celebrates 40 years of service to Palm Beach County, and it's our supporters who have allowed us to continue to operate, grow and help heal those who are suffering.

We look forward to the next 40 years of creating safer, more productive lives for infants, children, young adults and families. Sincerely,

HomeSafe is proud to be celebrating its 40th year of providing services to children and families in Palm Beach County. Through the years, the staff has provided unconditional care that has made a positive impact on the lives of hundreds of children and families needing help.

Here's a history of key events that have helped shape the agency over the last 40 years.

1980s

1970s

1979 - The Council on Child Abuse & Neglect of Palm Beach County is started by a group of concerned citizens who band together to prevent child abuse and neglect.

1980 - The Council opens The Children's Place program, offering a six-bed program offering daytime respite care for young children. Two years later, the program begins accepting overnight stays for children thanks to support from the United Way Community Chest & Health & Rehabilitative Services (HRS).

1988 - The agency purchases three small homes on Ponce de Leon Ave in West Palm Beach and coverts them into offices and living spaces for children.

1990s

1990 - The Council opens Connor's Nursery, the first shelter in the entire state of Florida to exclusively serve children with AIDs or who are HIV positive. A year later, the "Family Cottage and Sibling Shelter" is opened to provide temporary housing for children whose parents are in rehab.

1992 - The Council merges with Connor's Nursery & formally becomes known as The Children's Place and Connor's Nursery, Inc.

1993 - The Junior League of Boca Raton helps the agency open the "Children's Place South" in Boca – a 12-bed shelter for abused children.

1998 - The agency begins serving the abused population – children ages 10 - 17, opens three additional group homes, and starts providing foster home services. The agency also merges with Home Safe of Palm Beach County and changes name to The Children's Place at Home Safe, Inc. The SafetyNet domestic violence program becomes a part of the agency.

2004 - The agency takes a bold step in opening the first two specialized therapeutic group homes in Palm Beach County. The homes, located in Lantana, serve eight girls and six boys.

2005 - The Connor's Nursery program successfully comes to an end due to the advances in medical care for those afflicted with the HIV virus.

2000s

2006 - Construction is completed on the Sylvester Family Campus – 10 acres of land on Haverhill Road – thanks to the support of the Harcourt M. & Virginia W. Sylvester Foundation and many generous donors. This campus serves 24 boys through two Specialized Therapeutic and Enhanced group homes. The agency's administrative offices are moved to the Lake Worth office off Sixth Avenue South.

2009 - The Children's Services Council of Palm Beach County launches the The Healthy Beginnings Program and Home Safe becomes the exclusive entry agency for children entering the system between the ages of birth through five. The agency also adds four new locations across the county to meet the demand for prevention services.

2010s

2011 - The agency becomes known as *HomeSafe*.

2016 - HomeSafe at Pond Place on the Bernstein Independent Living Campus opens in November, providing 12 one-bedroom apartments for young adults who have aged out of foster care.

2017 - In October, the Haverhill campus was sold to MorseLife Health System. Proceeds from the sale are being used for the purchase of new property and the building of state-of-the-art facilities to serve clients.

2019 - Representatives of HomeSafe, the Children's Services Council and the University of Chicago met on a monthly basis to plan for the Thirty Million Words (TMW) program coming to Palm Beach County. Office space was secured and a program supervisor was hired. TMW is designed to help narrow the language gap between children from lower-income families and those in wealthier households. HomeSafe will be working with mothers and newborns at St. Mary's Hospital.



HomeSafe at Pond Place

Young adults ages 18 -23 who have aged out of foster care can access affordable housing through our Pond Place program.

Of the **15** clients, ALL were enrolled in school – **10** at Palm Beach State College and **5** at local high schools

9 clients worked full-time or part-time AND were a full-time student

4 clients graduated high school. 1 client graduated Palm Beach State College and transferred to Florida Atlantic University to complete their bachelor's degree

SafetyNet

Domestic violence victims break free from the cycle of abuse with immediate intervention and prevention services through the SafetyNet program.

335 domestic violence victims received crisis intervention services in either English or Spanish.

Of those, **112** adults, **31** teens and **37** children enrolled in group and/or individual therapy.

88% of adult and teen clients demonstrated improved coping and resiliency skills.

11 volunteers helped serve meals to the children prior to weekly group sessions, and provided child care to the children under age 5.

5 interns from both Florida Atlantic University and Barry University helped co-facilitate groups and provided supervised individual therapy to clients.





Residential Group Care

Our residential program provides a safe haven for abused children ages 7-17 who have been removed from their homes and require therapeutic treatment for their trauma.

101 girls and boys received full-time care and treatment servicesat 5 group homes located in Boca Raton, Lake Worth and WestPalm Beach

The agency continues to serve clients who have greater levels of trauma. This fiscal year saw 67 client discharges –

- 18 moved to another program or aged out
- 13 moved to a foster home or were adopted
- 9 were reunified with their family
- **27** were stepped up to a higher level of care

81% of the clients who attended school throughout the year maintained an **80%** attendance rate.

On the last day of school, of the **35** clients in the program, **100%** were promoted to the next grade level.

Healthy Beginnings

Through this program funded by Children's Services Council, our team screens and assesses children ages newborn to 5 and helps parents provide their children a healthy start.

14,539 new moms were visited by our team before they were discharged from the hospital and given helpful information about post-partum depression and child development.

209 portable cribs were provided for free to parents in need to ensure their child had a safe place to sleep.

1,924 children under the age of 5 were screened for their developmental and social/emotional health to ensure they are ready for kindergarten.

Maternity hospitals in our county were educated on becoming "Safe Sleep Certified" which is special recognition for demonstrating leadership for best practices and education on infant sleep safety. West Boca Medical Center was the first to become certified.


